Town of Scipio Newsletter

Greetings, friends and neighbors!

When I last wrote COVID was just on our radar. We are now six months into this pandemic. It's important for us to respect the safety and thoughts of all our neighbors. Together, we'll get through it. As a town board, we met via conference call for two months until new guidelines permitted us to resume in-person meetings. We all certainly look forward to the time when things return safely to a familiar normal.

As I think about the issues before the town, certainly the roads and the transfer station are high on the list. While the highway crews had a month off during the height of the pandemic, they have done a great job in catching up since their return. Our roads continue to be among the best for any town in the area.

Regarding the transfer station, we greatly appreciate DJ Grady's service over the years, but did recently make a staffing change with the hire of Tom Olenych as the new attendant. While stickers were not available for two months, we continued to operate the transfer station. The stickers primarily pay for the attendant and the emptying of the compacter container.

The town board is exploring options regarding recyclables. In years past, there was no cost to the town to dispose of recyclables. Last year it cost us about \$5000, and the cost jumped this year to nearly \$25,000. As a board, we are considering whether to recoup all or some of this cost, or just absorb it as a service to town residents. **We welcome comments from residents, as most towns in the area do not offer this service.**

Duke continues to pursue the solar array on Center Road. We are waiting for Duke to comply with the engineer's requests and to finalize the agreement with the county industrial development board, before we agree on the Community Host Agreement.

The town's Comprehensive Plan Update 2020 Public Hearing was in September. Check out the website townofscipio.com for important updates and news.

COVID has created difficulties for us all, and I hope this fall newsletter finds you well in our new reality. Despite COVID, work goes on in the County. Working with our Highway Department, repaving of Sherwood Road from Route 34B to Route 90 was completed this summer. This road, as anyone who has traveled it knew, was not just in bad repair, but actually dangerous, but no more. Work on the stretch between Routes 34 and 34B is on the tentative schedule for next year as well. These schedules change based on winter damage, but I will keep an eye on the plans and continue to advocate for Scipio roads.

As has become the norm, we have entered the 2020 Harmful Algae Bloom season and algae outbreaks are being recorded on all of our lakes. The weather this year - hot and dry - has been ideal for HABs. Given this, the presence of this dangerous infestation is actually less than might have been expected. However, we must continue to be vigilant. **Know it, Avoid it, Report it** is the continuing message of our County Health Department. 
Town Historian

Cobblestone Architecture in Scipio

Building with cobblestones is a unique architectural style that flourished for about 35 years from 1825 until the Civil War. There was an abundance of rounded or oblong cobblestones caused by the glacial deposits and lake wave action on Lake Ontario. Cobblestones were used in foundation construction and gradually came into use for home construction. As noted in "Cobblestone Masonry", 1966, Carl Schmidt accounts for four homes in the Town of Scipio as examples of the innovative methods used by masons that still stand today.

Each mason developed an individual style and technique, preparing his own mortar. The real secret of a good cobblestone wall depended on the high quality of mortar used. After the Erie Canal was finished in 1825, the stone masons turned their trade to constructing homes. The skill and artistry of the masons developed exclusive cobblestone constructions.

As the story is told in Richard Palmer's article "Brief History of Cobblestone Architecture", Dr. Benjamin Fordyce, a well known and respected man of Scipio spent two years accumulating the cobblestones from Lake Ontario to build his home in 1843. Wheat was hauled to Lake Ontario and stones were brought back on the return trip. The Fordyce/King home still stands just west of the Rte. 34/Center Rd intersection.



Please join us in recognizing and thanking Dodie Rowland's decades of involvement with the town. Having been the Town Clerk and currently our Town Historian, Deputy Clerk, and Deputy Registrar, she is the go to person, the glue, the one who knows.
